NSW Police Search and Rescue Award

Congratulations to members of the New South Wales Police Diving Unit, an ADAS Accredited Training Establishment (ATE), who were recently recognised in the Australian 2021 National Search and Rescue Awards.

The Professional Search and Rescue Award was awarded to NSW Police Divers, Senior Sergeant Raymon Busby, Sergeant Josh Lisle, Sergeant Steven Wye, Senior Constable Tim Boardman, and Senior Constable Ryan Good, for the rescue and recovery of two people swept into a whirlpool in the Blue Mountains.



Although the rescue involved conditions the team had not encountered before, and there was a high risk of them becoming trapped or entangled themselves, Mark Morrow from the Australian Maritime Safety Authority is quoted as saying "This incident was physically and mentally fatiguing for the officers involved and their efforts under the challenging circumstances were truly outstanding".

Over the past 10 years we are yet to see a significant pay rise in our industry and our industry has gone silent over these years, with the demand for divers currently in Victoria, now is the time for change and to unite together to negotiate an EBA with the diving companies in Victoria and to move our dive industry inline with an already booming construction industry here in Victoria."

DiveSafe

ADAS school, BURC, which is located in Turkey is currently involved in Project DiveSafe, a consortium of diving organisations aiming to develop an integrated system for scientific and environmental underwater systems.

The project receives funding from the European Maritime and Fisheries Fund (EMFF) program of the European Commission. Eight partners from Greece, Italy, Turkey, Israel and Malta are working in this project to have a market ready product in June 2022, with hire and lease options.

DiveSafe will integrate a number of diving-related technologies, equipment and apps into a comprehensive solution allowing for more efficient and safe scientific and professional diving missions.



The product is mainly composed of:

- Diver Propulsion Vehicle (DPV) / underwater scooter equipped with a mainboard and environmental and other sensors, manageable from an underwater tablet.
- 2. Underwater tablet with camera and apps for surveying, navigation and mission planning health & safety alerting.
- 3. Underwater acoustic positioning and communication system, for relaying data such as positioning and diver health data, to the surface support vessel.
- 4. Wearable sensors to monitor the physiological status of divers (Breathing/Heartbeat and Glycaemia monitoring).
- 5. Remote server that hosts the cloud database with raw and processed data from the underwater missions.
